I've read the 3 previous books in Brown's biography series. I still find her life fascinating, but this my least favorite of the 4. I can see why people think she is self-absorbed, but if you've read the first book and read the other books about her struggles with depression, you'll have a better idea of why she's travelling in Europe instead of being with her children. Maybe you'll like her recollection of her antics, maybe you won't. If you take her age and forget that she's a mother of 4 teenagers, it's a lot more entertaining - I too found myself a bit judgemental at times. But how many books would sell about a woman who never takes risks?

I gave up around 1/4 of the way. The author is too self-serving. Easy to see why she has problems at home. Any of us who have children know how hard headed they can be. And yes many of us know about family betrayal. Parents as well as spouses. But her version of not much money is laughable. Her sense of reality is skewered by alcohol and a childish notion that the world owes her. This woman needs to grow up. Who doesn't want to run away at times? Abandoned children by narcissistic parents have on going problems their entire lives. Aside from physical abuse, nothing is more harmful than abandonment. Sorry I had to even give it one star.

I finished the 3rd book in the series yesterday, purchased the 4th and finished that one today. Am purchasing the 5th tonight. Have to say, I am really going to be sorry when the 5th book is done. Can't remember when I've enjoyed reading anything quite this much. What an incredible life experience Marlayna has had and her ability to share through her books is amazing. What started out as sadness for what she went through as a child has turned into admiration as she moves through her adult life.

I'm enjoying Marlayna Glynn Brown's memoirs. Her life is interesting and she is insightful. The only problem I have with these books is that they need to be better proofread and corrected. It is very distracting and annoying when reading along and a word is left out, or a word or phrase is repeated obviously in error. The worst was when the name of a character kept changing back and forth throughout a chapter. Some of her people are assigned fake names to protect their identities; but what she tries out in a rough draft shouldn't be evidenced in the final text.

Marlayna has written another great book that is totally honest. The entire time I was reading, I found myself in the moment. I felt like I was walking side by side with her during her experience. She is my favorite author by far, and I always enjoy her books. Thanks Marlayna for your honest refreshing writing and for your friendship.
