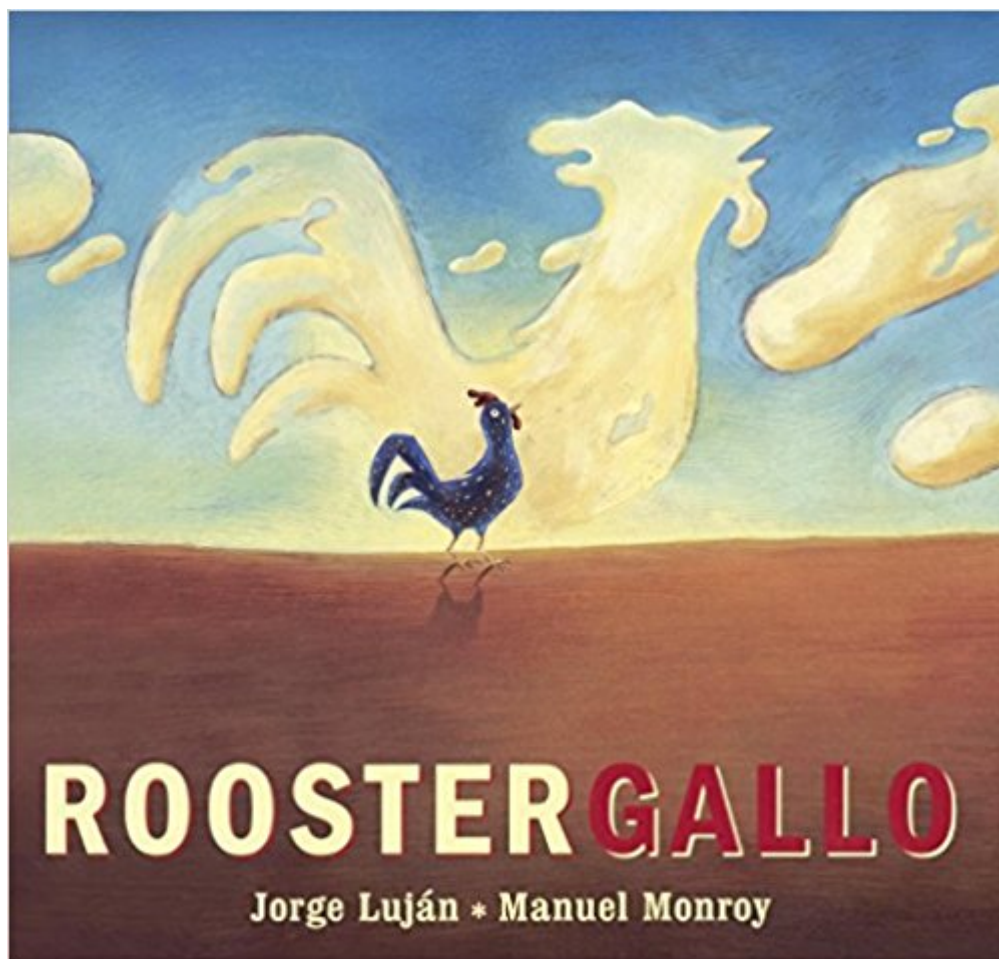

PreSchool-Grade 2 *Un* charming tribute to the diurnal round in a nine-line prose poem.

When the rooster opens his beak, the sun comes up and day begins. The night overwhelms the day, but this only serves to give that feisty rooster a chance to eat the stars, thus clearing the night sky for the new day. Reading equally well in the original Spanish and in the English translation, the text smoothly depicts the daily progression, with one line of the poem allotted to each spread.

PreS-Gr. 1. This small book at first seems like simplicity itself, but there's a sense of wonder here that will entice children who are following along in either English or Spanish. The text is short. In

English it reads: "The rooster opens its beak / and up comes the sun. / The sun opens its hand / and the day is born. The day is surprised when night / spreads its cloak and fills it with stars that the rooster can eat / and so clears the sky for a / new day." Each line appears on a page of the trim book, with the English translation under the Spanish words. The richly colored spreads are evocative as a blue rooster watches night slip into day and day slip back into night. Sunshine, stars, and clouds sprinkle the pages, but it is the rooster that draws readers in, bringing the day, savoring the night. Ilene Cooper Copyright © American Library Association. We checked this out from our local library and had to buy it based on the reaction of our 19-month-old daughter who adores this book. Gallo is a very simple, fun, unique, beautifully illustrated poem, which is easy to memorize in both languages even with my high school-level Spanish. This is fabulous for our family as my daughter is truly bilingual thanks to our nanny while I am trying to keep up with her Spanish. The poem is an imaginative story that toddlers can enjoy, while adults can appreciate the unique imagery. Our daughter giggles out loud when the "sun opens its hands" or the "rooster eats the stars"). Even at this age she understands something is silly about that. I think those poetic images help her conceptual ability and creativity. My daughter and I have a whole hand signal routine (a la "wheels on the bus" or "itsy bitsy spider") to go with the story that she cannot get enough of - in fact, she asks for me to recite the poem in the car, at bedtime, in the grocery store, anywhere. Truly a fun book that can provide hours of entertainment.

All ages of beginner Spanish students like this book. I teach this very dense but short and easy poetic book to beginner ELLs. They enjoy being a rooster, the sun, the night, the stars as they say their line and walk across the stage. It is a must have for Spanish-English bilingual programs.

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
