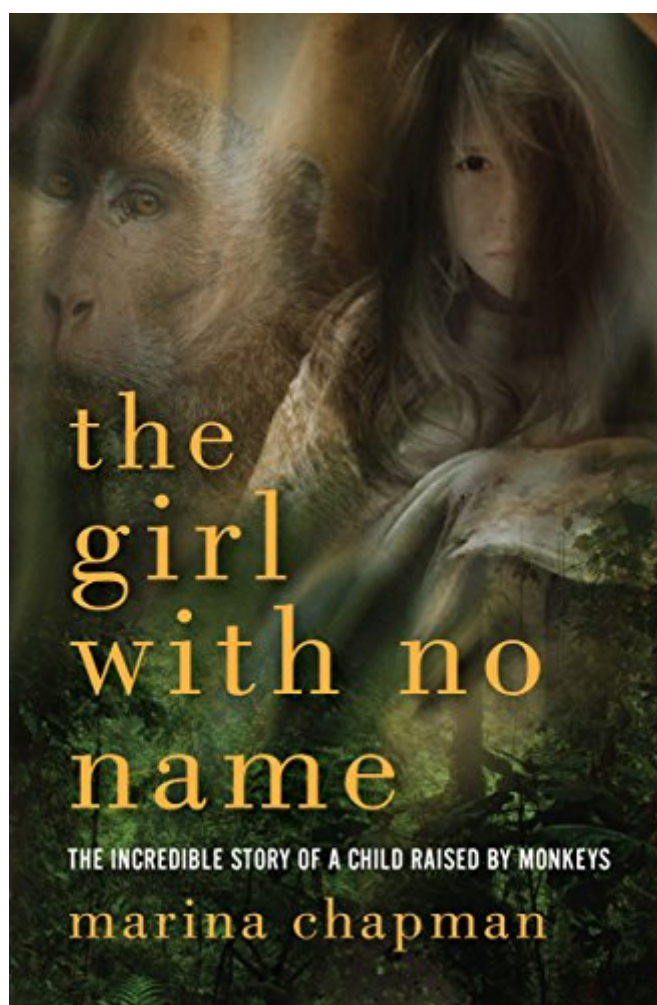

My only regret(spoiler) is that the book ends without completing her story. I look forward to a continuation of this remarkable tale, (I hope soon).

I was fascinated buy the story of Marina, once called Gloria, who couldn't remember her name as a small child. It was utterly convincing to me that she had lived with monkeys for about 5 years, and even forgotten how to speak and walk upright. With all the terrible things that it happened to her, the hardest thing to believe was that she grew up to be a reasonably normal woman that are family and that all they from her experiences did not spoil her life. This book is definitely worth reading and I am anxious to see the sequel!

This is an easy book to read, but the story is powerful and compelling without hyperbole. How a 5 year old child is kidnapped, deserted and survives in Columbia is fascinating enough, but the monkey years are a window into a whole different realm. Read it in one evening.

The book demonstrates truth is stranger than fiction! It is miraculous that she survived, that she overcame her feral beginnings without the help of psychologists etc.; that she somehow differentiated good from evil and chose goodness and love. She must also be extraordinarily intelligent.
