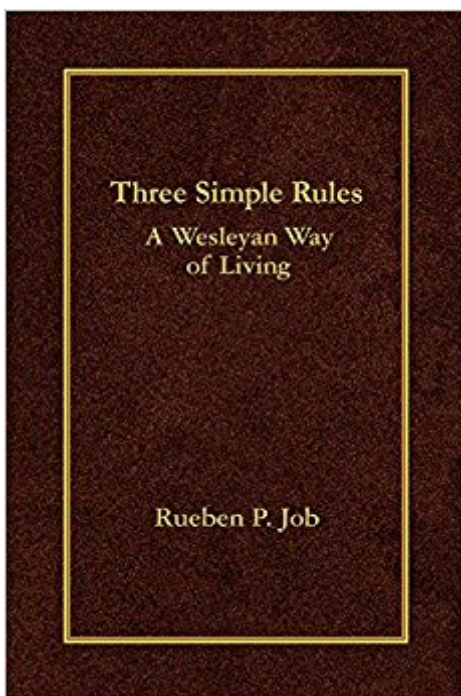

Rueben P. Job was a United Methodist bishop, pastor and acclaimed author and served as World

Editor of The Upper Room publishing program. Best-known for the classic book, *Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living*, he also authored or co-authored *A Guide to Prayer for Ministers and Other Servants*, *A Wesleyan Spiritual Reader*, *Living Fully, Dying Well, Listen* and co-edited *Finding Our Way: Love and Law in The United Methodist Church*. Bishop Job also chaired the Hymnal Revision Committee that developed the 1989 United Methodist Hymnal.

Don't let the "Wesleyan Way of Living" part of the title throw you. This little book has application for all Christians. I was raised in the Methodist faith from age 4 to age 19, so I knew who John Wesley was, but not knowing who Wesley was or not being raised in a Methodist church would in no way limit the usefulness and/or impact of this book in any believers life. In fact, I am now the pastor in a non-denominational Protestant church and recently used this book as the basis for a three part sermon series. The three simple rules found in this book (Do no harm, Do good, Love God) are a powerful reminder to the experienced follower of Christ, a succinct distillation of Gospel truth for the new believer/young Christian and an antidote to the intellectual/ivory tower tripe and the "power" gospel that seems so pervasive in what passes for so called Christian literature and preaching/teaching today. This is a simple "life application" book that will benefit all who read it.
