Syl Arena studied commercial photography at Brooks Institute and fine art photography at the University of Arizona. Over the years, Syl has shot for newspapers, magazines, and catalogs. He has been recognized for his expertise on color-critical workflow and his ability to turn noon to night by firing off a dozen Speedlites simultaneously. He is the author of the bestselling Speedliter's Handbook: Learning to Craft Light with Canon Speedlites. Syl covers the world of photography on his blog PixSylated.com, and he serves as the Director of the Paso Robles Workshops.

There are countless books written on the subject of photographic lighting providing varying degrees of useful and practical advice. What makes this book stand out is that it is a true tutorial, by which I mean it provides a complete learning journey from foundational concepts to detailed step by step instruction and explanations of how each image was accomplished. It is apparent that the author has a mastery of the subject matter (which many others possess as well). What differentiates Syl is his ability to transfer that knowledge to his readers. He goes to great length and in great detail to provide specific examples and explanations on each topic that he covers in this book in a manner that will be clear to any reader regardless of their skill/knowledge level at the time of reading. Those readers who are newer to lighting will appreciate that Syl leaves no detail unexplained. If he is talking about using specific lighting modifiers or accessories, he takes the time to explain the use and often includes photos and even alternatives. In addition to being a great tutorial, it also serves the function of being a great reference resource for photographers as they progress along the learning curve with their lighting skills. If you purchase the paperback, I have no doubt that it become dog eared over time as it is one of those books that you will come back to time and again. If you buy the Kindle edition, you will have a large number of notations and bookmarks. If you are looking to learn lighting or to build on your existing skills, this is a book that you will never regret owning.

I'm a big fan of Syl Arena and his teaching style, his first book has helped to teach me almost every basic there is to know about shooting with off camera flash and lighting in general.For the price that

has this book for you really can't go wrong - however if you're a fan and you've readà Speedliter's Handbook: Learning to Craft Light with Canon Speedlitesà Â then you're probably going to be disappointed since a lot of the information is repeated. It's GOOD information that bears repeating - but still, it falls short in teaching the existing fans new things. The book shares all the good traits of Handbook however - down to earth teaching style, very specific call outs to equipment and settings that make it so much easier to get context. Overall - an excellent addition to your learning arsenal - but consider it a refresher with slight tweaks. If you're new to the lighting game - then by all means grab this and enjoy.

Exactly what I would expect from Syl. I had read other books for him though more advanced than this one. Nevertheless, this book is what a beginner needs. I have to say that I used to hate using speedlites but started to like them when I read previous books from Syl. His approach is systematic which makes for an organized thought when processing any scene or job. In this book, he goes through all the stuff a beginner would face (White balance, shutter speeds, stops,... etc) up to real examples of some projects that he had done with explanations for step and why it was done. Despite talking about the gear but he makes it clear and emphasizes on creating, using and thinking about light and NOT accumulating gear. In many instances through out the book (and other books by him) he always suggests alternatives on a budget. Note though: He is, apparently, a practical man and he made it clear that he seldom uses his light meter. From my point of view as I've seen other professionals at work (and read some of their books), probably those professionals would disagree with Syl's approach on how to compose with light. However, Syl's approach to scenes as described in this book and others do fit my chain of thought well, as Syl depends on test shots greatly (which is easily done now with digital cameras) to make a decision for the final shot; There is no shame with that and he wants to you to learn to see and appreciate light. I know other professionals might not receive this as "adequate" and might tend to be perfectionists a bit with their light metering magic. All in all, it is a good book for beginners and I advice them to start reading it with their first speedlite or strobe to break that fear inside, just like I did.

At some point during your photographic journey, if you move past the point & shoot phase, you will come to the conclusion that the pop up flash on your DSLR is pretty much useless! It blasts a flat, uncontrolled glare of light on your subjects, blinding them and making them look like escapees from the police lineup. Then you will buy an external flash, and fumble around trying to learn how to set it up and where to put it. Then you will realize that lighting is just as important as learning all the

buttons and menus on your DSLR, and you will start searching for some useful advice. If you are reading this review, your search is over. Just buy the book. It is organized logically with effective illustrations and sample photographs. Every lighting situation is covered, including what kind of lights and reflectors to use, where to position them, recommended vendors, etc. Whether you read the book from cover to cover or just jump into the chapter that covers your immediate need, you will find the info you need.

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
