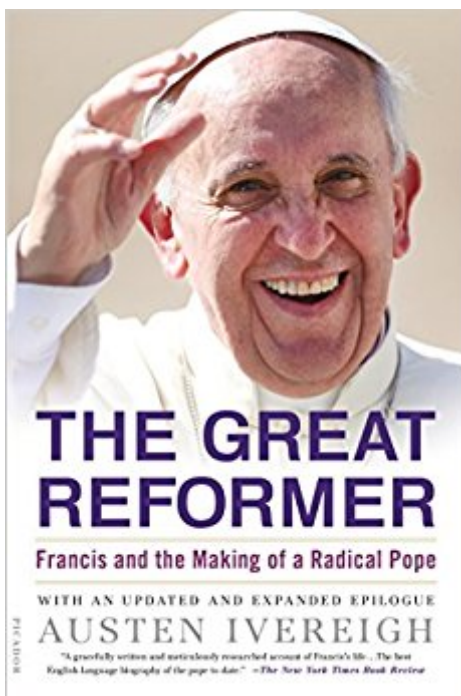

Austen Ivereigh is a British writer, journalist, and commentator on religious and political affairs who holds a PhD from Oxford University. His work appears regularly in the Jesuit magazine *American* and in many other periodicals. He is well known on British media, especially on the BBC, Sky, ITV and Al-Jazeera, as a Catholic commentator.

Fascinating - who knew that there are "bergolismos" in the Spanish speaking world (words that Card Bergoglio coined to express precise actions that had no word prior)? A lot of Argentine history to set the stage for the youth, formation, and early experiences of the man who became Papa Francisco, and which clearly colours his view of the world today. The concept of "pueblo fiel" as the ultimate deposit of God's truth rather than some committee, or quasi-governmental body, at the Vatican, explains his going out to the people and embracing them (quite literally in some cases!), explains his desire to be with the pueblo fiel whenever possible, and when not to be at least with the world as much as possible. It is an easy, but fast paced, read for someone with a historical interest, a little more attention needed to get the philosophical and theological intent of his pontificate, but worth the study.

https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pope_Francis Ivereigh shows how the conflict between the elite and the poor, between the liberals and conservatives, the military and Marxists and the pro- and anti-Peronists shaped the history of Argentina and the Argentine Catholic church. The ongoing and

often violent fights educated Francis. While much of his wisdom, good genes, common sense and good nature came from a family of Italian immigrants and faithful Catholics, he got particular strength and wisdom from his grandmother Rosa. The Jesuits and their discipline added to his intellect and spirituality. Their arguments and politics were part of his increasingly polished intellect and political savvy. Pope Francis is equally critical of Marxism, fascism, socialism, capitalism, liberals and elitists. He regards capitalism and socialism as failed systems. Both lead to violence and social upheaval. Both failed to increase social justice. He believed that the Catholic Church needed to reform and to reform from below. The indigenous and indigent should lead the reform. This is definitely not church reform imposed by the clergy or the pope. He believed in the collective wisdom of the people. Apparently when you meet him, you feel; you have his full attention. He seems totally focused on you and your concerns. He is not a CEO who rushes through an interview to get to more "important" things. In short he comes across as an intelligent, well disciplined, bright, warmhearted, decent and politically skillful human being. I think I would enjoy his company and enjoy discussing current Christianity, its problems and possible solutions, with him. You also will come to understand more about the intricacies of the Catholic Church and its internal politics. You will see the interaction of the church with the elite, the powerful and the poor. You will respect the imposed and self-imposed discipline of the Jesuits. It is a harder discipline than the learning and practice of medicine. [...] It also becomes obvious that the Catholic Church is not a monolithic structure. Instead you see all the divisiveness, though the fights are less vicious than current American politics. Ah me, whatever else we are all human and mostly too human. Organized Christian religion seems to have lost its way. We need a new Reformation. As in all human organization Christianity has become over supplied with detailed rules and leaders who have lost their and our way. We need a return to the simple beliefs and practices described by Christ. If we humans can do this, the future is assured. Pope Francis might be able to help us give birth to better future. I wish him well and I think his vision is appropriate for the current world. My scotch ancestors gave up on the Catholic Church and became Presbyterians. My German ancestors followed Martin Luther out of the Catholic Church and became German Evangelical and Reform. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Evangelical_Church_in_Germany The Irish ancestors remained Catholic until my grandfather Klein forced my Irish grandmother to leave the church. She never stopped missing the church and I suspect one of the reasons my father was a serious agnostic, was sympathy with his mother. The author has set himself a difficult task: to make into a coherent and readable narrative biography, theology, and political context. Ivereigh does it well. The book made me realize that our current pope has faced many sorrows in his life and that his great call to mercy is based on his personal knowledge of humankind and great faith. I have purchased two copies of this book to circulate among friends.

This is the best book on Pope Francis that I've read. It illustrates how profoundly immersed he is with "the people." He is truly a man whose ministry is "from below." Ivereigh illustrates time and again how the "discernment of spirits," steeped in the Gospels, is the fundamental template for Francis' decision making. So, it's no wonder he is doing and saying things contrary to a ministry "from above" and based on ideology (read here Pope JohnPaul and Benedict) rather than the Jesus of the Gospels. I found the book to be the best "retreat" experience I've had in a long time.

This is a well written and impeccably well researched book about the newest Catholic Pope, Francis. It is the story of a young man taught and formed by the Jesuit order, then shunned when he followed his spiritual call to cultivate his life after Jesus Christ, and prayer. It gives real hope to many millions of Catholics, who have been praying for reformation for years. With central beliefs of love and mercy, and LISTENING to God's holy people, the poor, destitute, and broken hearted, there is real hope for a Universal Church.

This is a good biography. Particularly useful is the first chapter which delves deeply into the historical background of Argentina. The political situation gets a little hard to grasp, but the essence is the manner in which Francis is able to deal with political allies and foes in a gentle pastoral manner. This is what we need right now.

I started reading this book on Pope Francis prior to his visits to Cuba and the US. I was moved to read more about this pope after reading his encyclical letter on "Caring for our Common Home" where he equates the destruction of wildlife and natural ecosystems as a moral issue as, in his view, these are all of God's creatures and should be cared for and protected rather than exploited and degraded. I am not a Catholic nor a Christian (essentially non-religious) but still find the Pope's life of great interest and his message of critical importance as we humans collectively verge on making planet Earth inhospitable to life, including humans.

An outstanding book...across the sweeping background of modern Argentina the reader gradually senses the development of a man who knows his place, not only in the history of his native land but in the developing history of the world and the Catholic Church. Rather than a 'great reformer' one senses in the pages that he is a contemporary prophet, driven by the Spirit.
