

Fastest Things On Wings: Rescuing Hummingbirds In Hollywood





Synopsis

A heartwarming account of the trials and triumphs a hummingbird rehabber encounters while caring for her tiny, fragile patients Before he collided with a limousine, Gabriel, an Annaââ $\neg \hat{a}_n ¢s$ hummingbird with a head and throat cloaked in iridescent magenta feathers, could spiral 130 feet in the air, dive 60 miles per hour in a courtship display, hover, and fly backward. When he arrived in rehab caked in road grime, he was so badly injured that he could barely perch. But Terry Masear, one of the busiest hummingbird rehabbers in the country, was determined to save this damaged bird, who seemed oddly familiar. During the four months that Terry worked with Gabriel, she took in 160 hummingbirds, from a miniature nestling rescued by a bulldog and a fledgling trapped inside a skydiving wind tunnel at Universal CityWalk, to Pepper, a female Annaââ $\neg \hat{a}_n ¢s$ injured on a film set. In their time together, Pepper and Gabriel form a special bond and, together, with Terryââ $\neg \hat{a}_n ¢s$ help, learn to fly again. Woven around Gabrielââ $\neg \hat{a}_n ¢s$ and Pepperââ $\neg \hat{a}_n ¢s$ stories are those of other colorful birds in this personal narrative filled with the science and magic surrounding these fascinating creatures. learns to eat formula from feeders, perch through the night, and develop basic flight skills. A week later, the teenager moves to a large flight cage where he practices more advanced flight skills, including 360-degree rotations and hovering in midair.

View larger View larger The young adult joins five to twenty rescued hummingbirds in an outdoor aviary, where he learns to mine flowers, use a sugar feeder, and catch fruit flies in flight. Before his release, the adult hummingbird masters sophisticated flight maneuvers, including how to flip, spin, barrel roll, and fly backward, sideways, upside down, and in a straight vertical. In the wild, the rufous migrates up to 7,000 miles each year. His wings rotate in a figure-eight pattern from sixty to over one hundred times per second.

Fascinating. I find that when I start reading, I can't put the book down. Except for the parts where the author goes on very long, multiple-page tangents about scientific information regarding hummingbirds. (I get it, she's knowledgable about what she does, but I feel it's too much for a narrative-style book.) There is also a curious thing that happens are the book progresses: the author sounds like she's starting to get burnt out. She starts to complain more and more AND MORE about how much hummingbird rehab has taken over her life. Each chapter reads as more of

a stand alone essay, with so much unnecessary recapping (which starts to really get to you about halfway through the book). She actually starts to restate statistics about how many hummingbirds she has rehabbed in her life, how many she rehabs in a given summer, etc. BUT, the statistics get inflated when she restates them!That being said, the stories in this book are amazing. They are so touching, so insightful. I cried countless times, both from feeling her pain and from feeling her joy. I would absolutely recommend this book to anyone who is considering it enough to be reading the reviews.

I read an excerpt from this wonderful gem of a book that Audubon shared on their Facebook page a couple weeks ago (who knew feeding hummingbirds tiny ants would kill them?). I was instantly hooked, not only by the poignant story of a bird rescue, but by the skill the author told it. I'm a picky (sometimes lazy) reader, but this narrative had everything I love in a good read: lots of interesting anecdotes from real-life, fascinating facts and information woven into the storyline and an astute, compassionate and insightful author. I couldn't wait to send a copy to my mother-in-law in New Hampshire who's going through a rough time, and I'm confident it will lift her spirits. I keep thinking of all the friends and family members who I know will love this book, and can't wait to tell them about it. (If you know anyone who maintains a feeder, this would be a perfect gift for any occasion!) If nothing else, this book helps us understand why it's so important to tune into the nature around us, even those of us who live in dense, urban communities. When we start to look and listen closer to these truly amazing creatures, we not only get to enjoy their beauty and antics, but learn about our own connection with the natural world---and why it's so important to find ways to sustain and nurture it. I salute Terry Masear's efforts and feel lucky she also had the writing chops to chronicle them in such an entertaining and meaningful way. For me, the true test of a great book is my excitement about telling others about it. And this is one of those reads.

Rehabilitating wildlife requires an extraordinary combination of knowledge, skill and dedication. One must have deep knowledge of the physiology of your patient but also the ability to intuit the needs of a creature incapable of human speech. You must be a counselor to the damaged psyche not only of your patient, but frequently to the humans who bring him to you - and often to yourself. Because rehabbing is not just a hobby or a career, it $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} , ϕ s an obsession. And the line between obsession and madness can be very thin. No knows this better than Terry Masear. Her book chronicles her life as a Hummingbird Rehabber in Los Angeles. Over the course of one insane summer she handles thousands of emergency calls, accepts one hundred and sixty orphaned birds

and learns more about them, her fellow Angelinos and herself than she thought possible.
