

Costa Rica is a popular destination for Norteamericanos so there is no shortage of travel guides pertaining to the country with plenty of advice on where to stay and what to see and how much you can expect to pay for all that. What has been lacking, up to now, has been a practical guide to day-to-day life in Costa Rica, a niche that Greg Seymour's book fills very well. How do you use the bus system or buy a car? How do you set up good wifi/phone connections? How do you go about renting a house or opening a bank account? Greg answers all those kinds of questions and does so in an entertaining way. A book like this could easily devolve into a dry and tedious list. But Greg explains everything with his trademark wry wit and engaging personal anecdotes. It is chock full of lots of extremely useful information. If you're planning to reside in Costa Rica for any length of time, and only have room in your luggage for one book, this is the one to take with you.

If you are going to Costa Rica it is well worth the price. I read it before we left on our 2 week journey to Costa Rica. We found almost everything to be true. There has been a few changes but most still are true. The addition that I would made is a Spanish to English and English to Spanish guide. We had a false sense of security that we could use the translator on our cell phone. Can not use without WIFI. We met some great people and a local guide that spoke both Spanish and English fluently.

Unlike a lot of people, I bought this book for my wife and I to read AFTER we got back from Costa

Rica. Fortunately, my wife and I have traveled and worked in other developing countries that have many of the same challenges.
