


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The Lance Thrower (Camulod Chronicles Book 8)

Jack Whyte does a superb job in this continuation of his version of the Arthur legend. This is the way Arthur really could have come to power. I've read this series (9 books in all) at least 5 times front to back and plan to read them again often at least once per year probably. I can't say enough good things about this author and this series!This is the penultimate book in Jack Whyte's outstanding retelling of the Arthur legend. This book takes quite a side trip which is absolutely necessary. Jack's series is historically based and so he has to deal with the historical fact that the French knight Lancelot is an analomy in the story. At this point in history there is no such country as France! Read it... it's great!

All the books of the Camulod series are worth reading. Many King Arthur novels move into the fantasy genre. With Camulod you keep thinking "It really could have been this way." It reads almost like a history. The disappointment is that Whyte ends when Lancelot meets Arthur as a young man and this is the last book in the series.Camulod is more about how a few very knowledgeable people see that Rome is falling and begin preparing to protect themselves when the legions are withdrawn. I gave this book 3 stars because it ended with the coming of age of Arthur. However the Camulod series as a whole I would give 5 stars.
