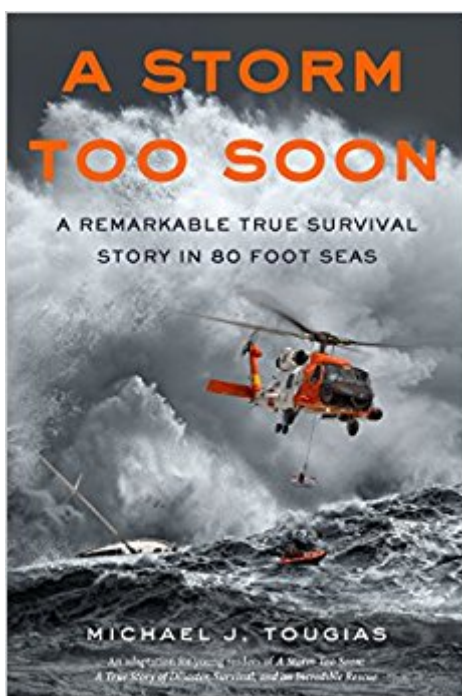


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A Storm Too Soon (Young Readers Edition): A Remarkable True Survival Story In 80 Foot Seas

When a forty-seven-foot sailboat disappears in the Gulf Stream during a disastrous storm, it leaves behind three weary sailors struggling to stay alive on a life raft in the throes of violent waves eighty feet tall. This middle-grade adaptation of an adult nonfiction book tells the story of the four intrepid Coast Guardsmen who braved the sea and this ruthless storm, hoping to rescue the stranded sailors. *A Storm Too Soon* tells a riveting true story that will delight young readers. Gr 4-8 • This true tale of survival and rescue at sea centers on three men who headed out to sail across the Atlantic Ocean from Florida to France only to cross paths with Tropical Storm Andrea. Waves quickly built to 80 feet high, and their 47-foot sailboat sank, leaving them adrift on a life raft with no means of communication. Despite the impossible circumstances, the Coast Guard completed an amazing rescue at sea. The dramatic narrative is engaging and won't disappoint students who enjoy adventure or rescue stories, though this is best suited for those with

an interest in sailing. An epilogue details how some of the survivors struggled with post-traumatic stress disorder and needed counseling, a valuable addition that underlines the severity of the experience. Michael J. Tougias’ book about an incredible at-sea rescue left me speechless. While this version I read is stripped down to a matter-of-fact account, I was nonetheless on tenterhooks wondering what would happen next. Everyone who loves adventure, SAR, the sea, friendships, and life-or-death situations will like this book. I was most impressed by the account of the rescue swimmer. He is truly a giant among men. I was really glad Tougias waited until the last line of the book to let us know that there is actual footage of the rescue attempt from the helicopter. Reading the story before watching the video is IMPERATIVE, as it means about a thousand times

more knowing what the men captured on film went through before the footage begins and throughout the video. Every home and library could benefit from having this book and others like it. It encourages us to follow our dreams, try difficult things, and never give up. I do have a couple of criticisms for the book. There is a photographic insert of 8 pages in the middle of the book that COMPLETELY spoils the ending. It is a rescue story! I am reading to find out what happened to J. P. and Ben and Raul and Drew and Nevada and Scott and the pictures tell me what happened to all of them when I am only halfway through! I also thought the writer should have referenced and emphasized the title a bit more to help the younger readers understand why the book was given that title. That being said, I loved the book and hope to read the full length version at some point.
