


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Perfect London Walk

This perfect London walk combines historical buildings, park settings and views of the city. The book gave great directions and descriptions of what to see and do along the way. I would recommend it to anyone who wants to visit parts of London that tourists usually don't see.

Unlike some of the other reviewers of this book, I HAVE done this walk - I don't see how you can review the book without having done it. That said, I will admit it's a bit out of date (when you use a specific tree as a guidepost, you risk the tree being gone at some point in time, and the opening times at Keats House have changed). So, if you especially want to visit Keats House, Highgate Cemetery or Kenwood, do check the opening days and times before you start so you aren't disappointed. The basic walk is still doable, and there is a map with all of the highlights marked on it. The background information on the people who lived there, loved there, worked there, or died there, is just enough to pique your interest without being dry and overwhelming. It's a great stroll through Hampstead, an area the average tourist doesn't know about, so if you want to get off the beaten path, this is perfect. Highgate cemetery is also a fascinating place - you might think a cemetery is an odd place to visit, but it's really worthwhile. Do plan on spending a whole day doing this walk! The author points out the best options to stop for a drink or meal along the way. I lunched at the Spaniards Inn and it was atmospheric and the food good.

When you have the audacity to call something "perfect", you should make more of an effort to merit the title. This is a nice little book, and the walk is lovely, but I have seen much better books (and walks). What does make this book charming is that one can imagine walking with Mr. Curley, hearing him recite the literary passages presented here and seeing the sites discussed; indeed, one need not depend solely on imagination since there are a generous number of (black-and-white) photographs included. A very good map of the area is included. But the book fails as either a ramble

or a tour guide. If it is a ramble, let there be more narrative; if it is a guidebook, then let there be more information. Taking the walk with Mr. Curley is undoubtedly a wonderful experience.

Unfortunately this book does not capture that experience.

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
