

I am using this book for both my rising 7th (struggles in math) and my 4th grader (advanced learner) and I can not say enough good things about the Spectrum Math series. Information is scaffolded well, laid out clearly and concisely. Material is not dumbed down. Lesson are SO important for 6th/7th grade and the way they explain exponents and powers of 10 and percents are critical in mastering material needed in later grades. It isn't straight drilling, but offers lots of review. This book actually teaches your child how to do the problems, but you have to teach the WHY. The materials is right in line with a 5th grade curriculum. My 4th grader is advanced learner with exposure to fractions, multi-step multiplication, area models, metrics and division. This is a solid book for her to advance to the 6th grade curriculum this year and I don't feel like anything is getting missed. My 7th

grader has gaps of knowledge ALL OVER THE PLACE and struggles with Math. I am taking her back to build her up. She has more exposure to upper level content, but never learned WHY she was doing things and manipulating problems a certain way. This is just what she needs to get caught back up. The schools say they remediate your kids (they don't - they just teach them how to pass the EOG test), but this book actually does teach your child (you need to help of course). If you have your child work through it consistently and with fidelity, they will either advance their knowledge one level or bridge gaps they may have missed at this level. I feel relieved to have found this series for both my girls and am excited to start the 6th grade workbook which is also high rated in my opinion.

These workbooks are how we keep our kiddo's brain exercised during summer months. They are great for self-paced and self-managed learning.SUGGESTION: If you use this for alone quiet time, don't be surprised if they return a completed chapter in less than 5 minutes -- unless you rip out the answer key and hide it before handing them the book. True story.

So my kiddo has been struggling with math here recently so I bought this for him. While he hates it and the fact that I am making him do more math than what the school is giving him; I love it. Totally worth the price.

This book is great for your 7th grader. My child is going into pre algebra next month when school starts here. This will be a great step into it. I highly recommend this during summer time either to brush up on 7th grade math or to learn something new before the rest of the class does. I've been buying workbooks for my kids since they were a toddler. It gives them better confidence when they know what's being taught versus just learning and being unsure in the classroom where they feel rushed.

I am really glad I got this for my 9th graders because it is challenging. There are problems \*I\* don't know how to solve. It is a really good challenge for any young math whiz.

A good book for review, but it does not have enough practice problems or examples. I suppose for the price it is understandable, but personally I was hoping for more. Some of the answers I checked were actually incorrect, or rather, the instructions were ambiguous. For the assignments, I didn't let my student use a calculator as schools typically don't allow calculators. This was problematic, however, because some of the calculations are ridiculous to do without them.

There are explanations at the start of each lesson which I like because the student can work independently. The sample examples could be more explicit. The answer key in the back helps me.

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
